

those who have it as well. It is more common in people who are overweight, those who have a family history of it, and is key!

AARP has suggested ten things that you can do to protect yourself:

1. Lock your mailbox, Try to keep your mail from being stolen.

2. Don't leave anything of value in your parked car, not your wallet or purse or any mobile devices.

3. Shred all sensitive documents with a shredder that shreds documents into confetti.

4. Secure your smart phone with a password, Don't use a password that is easy to guess such as birthdays, or sequential numbers.

5. Change your computer
